10. Course Aims:
The course History of Architecture and Urban Studies 2 (HAUS 2) consists of three components: HAUS 2-A (History of Architecture) HAUS 2-B (The City) HAUS 2 Electives
The aim of the course is to familiarize students with architecture in the urban context in the 19th and early 20th centuries. After completion of the course students will be able to reproduce the most important theories and ideas that underlie Western architecture and urban development in the 19th and early 20th centuries as well as display in-depth knowledge on select topics from this period.

11. Intended Learning Outcomes of Course:
At the end of the course each student should have the ability to demonstrate and/or work with:

- A broad knowledge of the scope, defining features, and main areas of the discipline of architecture.

12. Indicative Content:

The component HAUS 2 A focuses on the History of Architecture from the mid 19th to the mid 20th centuries, including topics such as the Victorian Revival, National Romanticism, the Arts and Crafts movement, the Beaux-Arts tradition, and the modernist movement.

The component HAUS 2 B focuses on the city from the early 19th to the mid 20th centuries, including topics such as urbanization, new model towns, the history of town planning and regulation, and urbanization in developing countries.

The component HAUS 2 Elective allows students to focus on specific subjects in the field of architecture and urban studies, such as the architecture of pre 19th century periods, the architecture of specific places, the history of ideas, and the social, economic and political factors that influence architectural design in the urban context.

Students are required to take HAUS 2 A and B and one from a range of HAUS 2 Electives offered.
