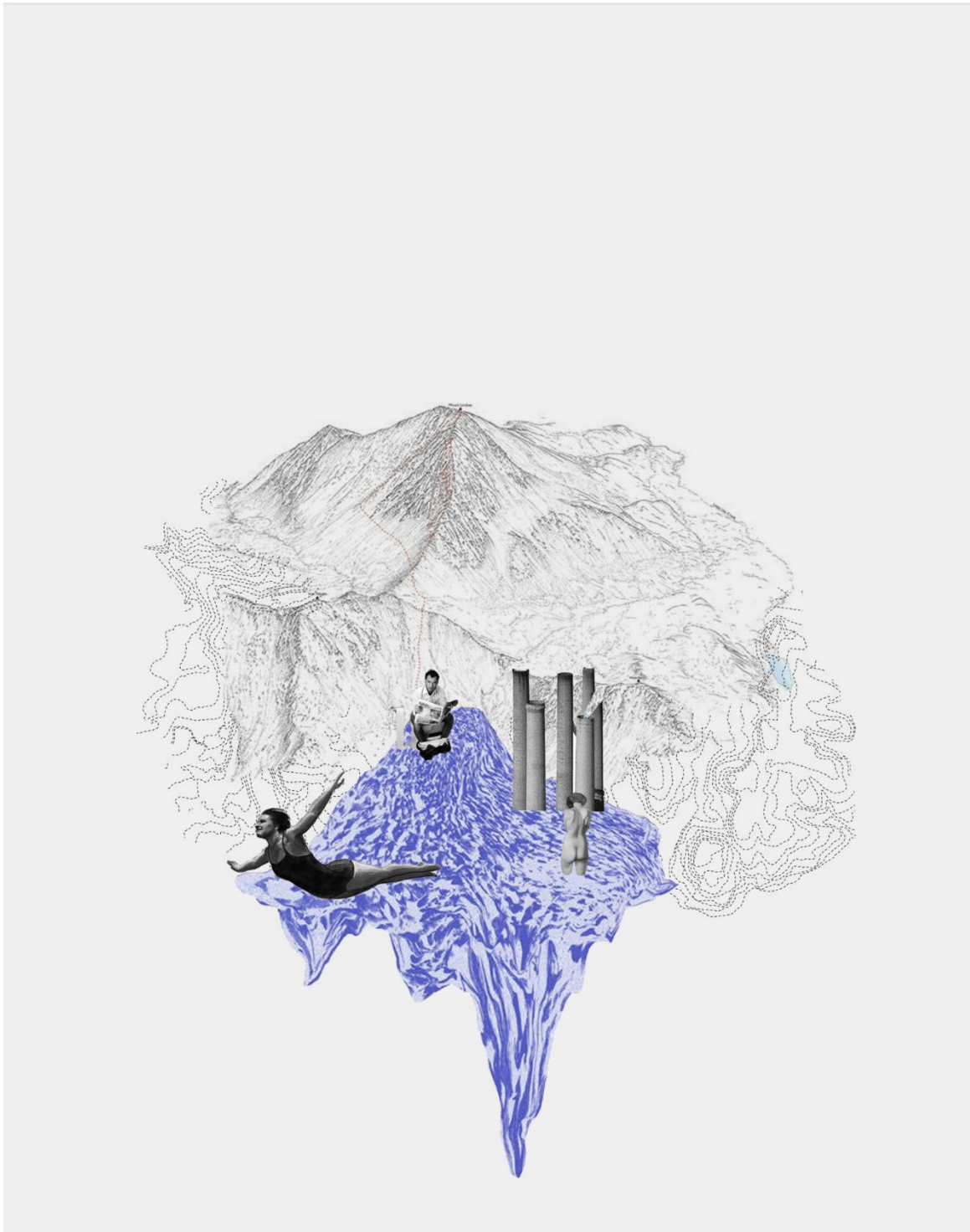

### Course Introduction

The Elective Research Paper offers students the opportunity to gain knowledge in an alternative pathway. Students can benefit from the multi-disciplinary nature of the Programme and develop a deeper understanding in this chosen pathway through lectures and tutorials. This knowledge is designed to support a greater understanding of the broad field of architecture and allows students to relate this new knowledge to their own specialist pathway.

Through this course students can research, analyse and develop their wider research interest within an alternative pathway as well as developing skills and knowledge on research methodologies, the identification and resolution of a research question and academic writing practice.

Students are taught through a combination of group and individual tutorials and lectures and seminars. Through formative feedback and peer sessions, students apply their learning on the course across the semester.

### Course Aims

The aims of the course are to:

**professionalism:** facilitate a student's command of knowledge of professional ethics through the production of an appropriate response through academic writing practice, to a self-directed research question in an alternative pathway

**design/create:** facilitate a student's command of a creative design process through the production of an appropriate response through academic writing, to a self-directed research question in an alternative pathway

**research:** facilitate a student's command of research skills with a self-directed research question and the development of an appropriate response through academic writing practice, in an alternative pathway

**communication:** facilitate a student's command of the integration of analogue and digital media to visually and verbally communicate structured thinking through the production of an

appropriate response through academic writing practice, to a self-directed research question in an alternative pathway

**skills:** facilitate a student's command of critical reflection, communication and a structured methodology, with digital and analogue tools, through the production of an appropriate response through academic writing practice, to a self-directed research question in an alternative pathway

**knowledge:** facilitate a student's command of the creative use of advanced architectural theories, concepts, and techniques to address social, ethical and climate change challenges through the production of an appropriate response through academic writing practice, to a self-directed research question in an alternative pathway

### Indicative Content

The Elective Research Paper is designed to support a student to appraise, integrate and articulate their wider research interest within an alternative pathway and develop a research question which is tested through the preparation and analysis of developed case studies, precedents and theories. Students will evidence their literature review, relevant research, their chosen methodology and an appropriate response through academic writing practice. Students are required to critically reflect and draw conclusions from research and relate this to their chosen Pathway.

During the course students will be supported to:

- undertake fieldwork and/or desktop/library research to analyse a topic of their choice
- produce a literature review and set their own approach in a scholarly context
- sustain an individual line of inquiry
- test a hypothesis based on appropriate sources
- critically reflect and draw conclusions from research undertaken

### Description of Learning and Teaching Methods

#### **Pedagogy:**

Studio is both a learning space and a form of reflective practice where knowledge, skills and attributes are transformed into design led research competencies. Integration of the six learning domains enables design led research work to be grounded in specialist knowledge relating to the student's chosen alternative pathway. This course is intended to develop students' mastery of academic writing practice while deploying their critical, ethical and professional position. Student learning is developed through the course, supported by lectures, tutorials and seminars, which enable students to address real-world issues in the context of wider architectural practice. Groupwork and collaboration with other Pathways are core to the student learning experience, enabling students to work productively with others while contextualising the role of the architect in relation to other disciplines and practices. Specialist Pathway Leaders along with visiting guests offer students insights into the constantly changing world of architectural practice. Independent learning is fostered throughout the year.

#### **Delivery:**

The course is delivered through regular studio sessions, using a range of learning and teaching activities, including individual and group tutorials, seminars and lectures by staff and invited guests. Peer discussions offer the opportunity for critical discourse around issues raised by the Elective Research Paper, enabling staff and students to enter into a dialogue around contemporary architectural issues. A hybrid approach to learning through in-person sessions and on-line support offers students access to flexible and inclusive learning.

#### **Timetable:**

#### **Canvas:**

The virtual learning environment tool Canvas is used for the dissemination, discussion, and access to relevant course information, and to signpost students to other relevant teaching and learning platforms used by GSA.

### Description of Formative Assessment and Feedback Methods

Formative activities are provided during studio courses, offering students the opportunity to obtain ongoing staff and peer feedback through discussion and review in relation to the course.

As such Formative feedback provided throughout the course fosters reflective learning while supporting the Summative graded assessment and feedback process, which generally happens at the end of the course.

### Description of Summative Assessment arrangements

Summative assessments undertaken at the end of the course and is designed and delivered to support student learning through evaluation of the Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs) for each course, aligned with the professional competencies required for architectural practice. Summative assessment in this course is undertaken through a coursework assignment in the form of a 3,000-word essay. Coursework assignment submissions involve visual and text-based submissions utilising both digital and physical tools and formats. Written feedback is provided on all summative assessments.

All submissions will be assessed and moderated in line with the GSA Code of Assessment. Reassessment opportunities where a student has not passed the course are outlined in the GSA Code of Assessment.
