## **English Language Requirements**

Applicants who are not a national of, nor have obtained a degree in one of the countries on the approved <u>UKVI</u> <u>exemption list</u> or those who require a Student Visa, will need to provide evidence of their English language ability.

GSA's preferred test is the IELTS for UKVI (Academic) test taken at a UKVI approved test centre. GSA require all students, who require a student visa, to meet the following requirements to gain entry:

- IELTS for UKVI Academic with an overall score of 6 with a minimum of 5.5 in all components;
- An alternative Accepted English Language Test which can be found on the Postgraduate '<u>How to</u> <u>Apply'</u> page of the GSA website.

#### 3. Programme Introduction

BA (Hons) Fine Art at Glasgow School of Art is a dynamic, studio-centred programme, fostering communities focused on exploring and shaping contemporary art.

The ethos of the School of Fine Art emphasises creative dialogue and celebrates the diverse experiences and perspectives of the students and staff who make up our community. The programme embraces practices and histories from all over the world, whilst also being deeply rooted in the vibrant artistic potential of Glasgow, recognising its significant contribution to the cultural landscape of Scotland and the UK, as well as its international reach.

Glasgow's rich cultural and artistic heritage will inform the work you make. You will test your work in a public context through engaging with some of the city's numerous cultural spaces and venues. Designed to build confidence, these external events and exhibitions enable you to explore how your

practice can engage audiences and reach new publics. The city will animate and help drive your practice and you will contribute to the way Glasgow is continually enlivened by artists, musicians and other creatives who choose to live, study and work professionally in the city.

The School of Fine Art curriculum invites you to push the boundaries of your discipline and encourages interdisciplinary collaboration. The BA Fine Art Programme is made up of three discipline-focused, studio-based departments: Sculpture and Environmental Art; Fine Art Photography; and Painting and Printmaking

The department of **Sculpture and Environmental Art** enables you to explore dynamic relationships between object-making, material and dematerialised practice, public art, and social engagement. The approach of the department is a pioneering, multidisciplinary exploration of contemporary art practice underpinned by an immersion in the critical dialogues and cultural debates that shape the future of art practice. Events, exhibitions and performances on the GSA campus, in the city and its surrounding landscape give the curriculum a particular character that allows you to develop a practice that explores how art engages with people, places and our social environment.

The **Fine Art Photography** department provides a unique platform to explore photography and its role as a specialist medium within contemporary fine art practice. With a focus on experimentation, hands-on creation and critical enquiry you are invited to challenge historical and conventional notions of the photograph. You will ask critical questions of the medium through your research and the work you develop and exhibit to explore photography's possibilities and contribute to its future direction.

Painting and Printmaking at GSA reflects the complex and changing conditions, ethics and currencies of art-making, responding to new ideas. An awareness of histories and applications of painting and printmaking alongside contemporary debate are all fundamental to our programme of study, which acknowledges and critiques our disciplines' legacies, and prioritises experiment and innovation. The programme encompasses a range of approaches to our disciplines and proposes expanded ways of making and thinking.

Running throughout all four stages of the programme is a series of interdisciplinary credit-bearing courses designed to deepen your critical awareness, allow opportunities for cross disciplinary working and extend the set of influences that help underpin your practical enquiry. These include the **Fine Art Critical Studies** (FACS) courses which bring together students from other departments to research and discuss key ideas that inform the way art is made, received and understood. Your FACS courses are geared towards cultivating your intellectual curiosity, engaging you with different ways to perceive, explain, and understand how meaning is made through critical theory and artistic practices.

The BA (Hons) Fine Art programme is led by a team of dedicated practicing artists, writers, curators and researchers and nurtures the development of a dynamic, inclusive and supportive learning environment. A range of learning styles and approaches to making work are supported and there is significant level of choice in how, and the pace at which, you learn. This is exemplified in the final year where you can opt for writing a dissertation or select a shorter extended essay alongside a unit called Creative Platforms that challenges you to extend your research and practice in a public context.

Creative and intellectual independence, developing resilience and self-reliance, whilst also acknowledging your inter-dependence with others, are encouraged. The programme facilitates the development of graduate attributes including the ability to collaborate, utilise interpersonal skills

and effectively communicate. These are supported by an enterprising learning culture that engages students as responsible citizens with an active awareness of ethics, safety, sustainability and social justice.

BA (Hons) Fine Art at the Glasgow School of Art prepares students for the future, whether you want to pursue careers as artists, in arts education, writing, curation or other creative areas. The programme seeks to create assured and specialist fine art graduates with individual and creative identities, prepared for employment, self-employment and postgraduate study.

### 4. Programme Aims

The aims of this programme are to:

- Build research skills and methods to enable the ongoing development of fine art practice, contexts and theory
- Enable you to be critical and reflective in your approaches to making and thinking within a fine art context
- Build understanding, skills and processes in fine art that encourage an experimental and exploratory approach to practice and the development, realisation and presentation of bodies of work
- Develop a community of practice that enables collaboration and promotes sharing, equity and inclusion
- Support you to build autonomy, communication and professionalism through self-directed learning and engagement
- Foster an awareness of ethics, sustainability and social justice as relevant to fine art as well as social and professional contexts

## **5. Programme Intended Learning Outcomes**

After full participation in and successful completion of the programme, you will be able to:

- Build a continuous and active practice of research that supports the development of your work in relation to the wider contexts of fine art practice and theory
- Establish critical thinking, reflection and evaluation through your enquiry in fine art
- Generate individual creative practice and processes to make artwork and related activities allowing for experimentation, risk and the realisation of ideas
- Engage with and create opportunities to share, exchange or collaborate with others to stimulate ideas, develop practice and promote community
- Demonstrate skills in communication and self-directed learning to develop directions for future personal and professional development
- Evidence an awareness of social integrity and ethics in the development of your practice and learning

## **6. Description of Learning and Teaching Approaches**

A variety of teaching and learning approaches are employed to support student engagement with the curriculum and the achievement of the intended learning outcomes. These include:

- Briefings and inductions
- Material and process workshops
- Studio practice and activities
- Individual and group tutorials
- Group critiques

- Talks, lectures and seminars
- Study visits and trips
- Peer learning and collaborative activities
- Presenting and sharing work with others
- Internal/external exhibitions, events and live projects
- Reflection and self-evaluation

Digital skills, materials and technical resources are introduced through inductions, demonstrations, and workshops.

Independent learning skills will be developed and supported through guided activities and digital online learning resources available on Canvas.

A variety of teaching and learning approaches, including in person, blended and online learning and delivery, are employed to support student engagement with the curriculum and the achievement of the intended learning outcomes.

### 7. Description of Assessment Methods

Formative assessment offers you the opportunity to obtain tutor and peer feedback through the development of your summative submissions over the length of each course. You are supported in your learning through a range of formative activities with tutors and peers, such as workshops, critiques and tutorials offering ongoing formative feedback as you progress through each course within this programme.

Summative Assessment is designed to support you to review, collate and communicate work produced in response to project briefs and/or independent learning and teaching activities and associated with the programme and its courses.

Submissions will be assessed and moderated in line with the Code of Assessment.

Study Abroad is open to applications for full-year, Semester 1, and Semester 2, entry on Stage 2 and Stage 3 of the BA (Hons) Fine Art programme. Study Abroad students will be entered into the most appropriate year entry point based on their portfolio and application.
