Course Introduction

Through studio and workshop-based learning, this course progresses textile design practice by providing opportunities to apply design and technical processes for the textile pathways of weave, knit, print and embroidery.

Students undertake research, drawing and colour to generate visual inspiration and ideas for textile design. The course encourages students to continue to apply and develop core technical and material skills by translating visual information through design development and textile sampling.

The course supports students in evolving their understanding of weave, knit, print, embroidery, sustainable practices and textile design contexts to support their ideas and interests through research using different sources.

Towards the end of this course, students reflect upon feedback, their pathway experiences, skills, and abilities to apply to a textile pathway for advanced study during Stage 3. Pathway selection is supported, discussed, and finalised in consultation with staff based on aptitude and potential. It is necessary to cap pathway numbers related to resources.

Course Aims

The aims of this course are to:

- 1. embed core research skills and methods to generate visual inspiration and ideas
- 2. encourage a range of drawing and colour approaches to explore inspiration and ideas
- 3. apply core technical, material and design skills for different textile pathways to translate visual information through design development and textile sampling
- 4. enhance core independent study skills and peer group learning through studio and workshop practices
- 5. develop understanding of weave, knit, print, embroidery, sustainable practices and contexts for textile design
- 6. refine core organisation, editing and presentation skills to communicate to peers, staff and other audiences

Course Intended Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course students will be able to:

- 1. generate a range of primary and secondary research for visual inspiration and ideas for textile design
- 2. demonstrate a range of drawing and colour approaches to explore inspiration and ideas for textile design
- 3. apply and evidence technical, material and design skills for different textile pathways to translate visual information through design development and textile sampling
- 4. reflect on progress, resource use, working practices, skills and abilities towards specialist textile design study
- 5. evidence understanding of textile pathways, sustainable practices and contexts for textile design by collating a range of examples of existing practice
- 6. demonstrate organisation and presentation skills to communicate work to peers, staff and other audiences

Indicative Content

This course will introduce students to:

- advancing core research, drawing, colour and design skills for textile design
- applying health and safety and responsible working practices for textile pathways
- applying technical and material skills to translate visual information through textile sampling for textile pathways
- further examples of existing design practice relevant to different textile pathways
- exploring pattern, repeat, placement, composition, scale and visualisation
- reflecting on learning, skills and abilities to consider and apply to a textile pathway
- organising, editing and presenting textile samples and project work

Description of Learning and Teaching Methods

This studio course is designed as a project-based course. Project briefs encourage an independent, tutor-supported approach to directed and self-directed study.

A range of learning and teaching methods are used to support students to engage in an explorative and individual approach to learning. As an indication, these include:

- briefings
- inductions and demonstrations
- technical workshops
- studio activities
- individual and group tutorials
- talks, lectures, seminars, and study visits
- group critiques and reviews, peer review, and presentations
- presentations and writing
- reflection and self-evaluation

Skills, including digital, material and technical resources, are introduced through inductions, demonstrations, and workshops.

Independent learning skills will be developed and supported through guided activities and digital online learning resources available on Canvas.

A variety of teaching and learning approaches, including in person, blended and online learning and delivery, are employed to support student engagement with the curriculum and the achievement of the intended learning outcomes.
