## **Course Introduction**

This course explores approaches to making that span contemporary Fine Art practice including the synergies and space between disciplines and notions of cross-, inter- and expanded disciplinarity. The course fosters collaboration and students and staff from across the undergraduate departments come together to explore ideas and build communities of practice.

This is a project based studio course which offers you choice through selecting a tutor-led strand, which are designed to be responsive to research-teaching linkages and disciplinary and material developments. You are encouraged to extend your ways of thinking, to try new ways of working and to explore the boundaries of your practices. You will re-examine your discipline base, by testing it against contemporary practice, to support you to develop your own position.

The course facilitates you to build your understanding of ethical, sustainable and inclusive art practice. Critical reflection will be a key component in the assessment and you will be asked to reflect upon the ideas and processes you have been introduced to as well as how these impact on your own studio practice.

#### Course Aims

The course aims to

- Introduce you to notions of disciplinarity, cross and interdisciplinarity and the expanded field within contemporary fine art practice
- Introduce you to a range of Fine Art processes and practices, including those that bridge, expand or work between traditional notions of discipline
- Enable experimental and innovative approaches to making fine art, including collaborative ways of working
- Foster peer learning and communication skills

## **Course Intended Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course you will be able to:

- Evidence research and critical study of cross and interdisciplinarity and expanded fields within contemporary Fine Art practice
- Demonstrate experimental and expanded approaches to your own practice
- Contextualise practice within a contemporary and historical field or discipline
- Evidence engagement with collaboration and shared learning

#### **Indicative Content**

The course is delivered in seminar groups with students selecting one of the strands available. You will sign up to one option that focusses on process and practices that cut across or fall between Fine Art traditional disciplines. Options might include (indicative),

- Thinking Drawing
- Curating and Archiving
- Reading and Writing
- Virtual Spaces
- Performing and Performativity
- Haptic Materialities
- Being Social
- Creative Pedagogies

The course will introduce you to:

- Cross disciplinary learning
- Fine Art research methods
- Ideas and approaches outside subject specialisms
- Experimental processes and approaches to fine art
- Peer learning and collaboration across departments
- Presentation and communication skills

## **Description of Learning and Teaching Methods**

You will be taught in cross-departmental groups led by tutors from across the School of Fine Art's undergraduate departments.

A variety of teaching and learning approaches, including in person, blended and online, are employed to support student engagement with the curriculum and the achievement of the intended learning outcomes. These may include:

- Briefing
- Introductory lecture
- Workshop and collaborative activities
- Contextual seminar
- Group critique

You will be guided in developing an independent and self-directed approach to study and to utilise the collaborative learning environment of the studio as a place of ethical, sustainable and inclusive practice.

Peer learning is a key component of the course as you will be embedded within a subject specific community of practice. There are opportunities to engage with a wider context including Glasgow's cultural spaces.

Digital and material skills and technical resources are introduced through inductions and engaging with technical workspaces. Independent learning skills are developed and supported through guided activities and digital online learning resources available on Canvas.

## **Description of Formative Assessment and Feedback Methods**
