Course Introduction

This course is delivered in Stage 2, Semester 2 and consists of 200 notional learning hours of which 80 will be with direct staff contact time (or as otherwise directed by University of Glasgow Language Lab faculty who deliver the course).

The Languages course provides a personal study option for students from the BDes/MEDes Product Design and BSc Immersive Systems programmes. Students choosing the MEDes (Master of European Design), for example, are obligated to attend Languages course as this prepares them for the acquisition of languages skills in the future. Students not choosing the MEDes may wish to undertake the study of Languages as part of their skills portfolio. Students will develop the linguistic skills they will need to allow them to cope confidently, at a fundamental level, with most everyday social and "survival" situations in the target language and gain insight into the culture and way of life of the target country to enable them to integrate more easily into a foreign environment.

Course Aims

This course provides students with the opportunity to:

- Develop the skills required to facilitate the learning of a foreign language, through verbal delivery, aural comprehension and written communication.
- Develop language skills in areas related to students' studies and work.
- Develop awareness of the customs, culture and society of the countries in which the language is spoken
- Develop transferable skills such as communication, confidence, initiative, independent learning, social/cultural sensitivity and time management.

Course Intended Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course students will be able to:

- Convey a linguistic competence capable of supporting academic exchange at a foreign institution or industrial placement.
- Exchange information on familiar topics, such as personal details, both orally and in writing, as appropriate to some specific socio-cultural contexts.
- Understand short and straightforward reading and listening materials on familiar topics.
- Understand and use basic grammar structures of the target language, including present and past indicative

Indicative Content

Guided formal scheduled sessions that include individual and group practical exercises (for speaking, listening, reading and writing), grammar and vocabulary input.

Description of Learning and Teaching Methods

Sessions of directed self-study using the Language Centre's audio-visual facilities.

Weekly time devoted to consolidating work covered in class.
